

About Working Groups

What are they?

A Working Group (WG) is a collaborative network of individuals acting as representatives of member organizations who are engaged in exchanging information and developing policy positions on issues* relating to a particular area of concern.



An issue can be anything that challenges our members' work and thus newcomer rights on the ground, including anything from the impact of racism to immigration detention.

A WG has a broad agenda of issues with which it is concerned including new initiatives as well as issues with which the CCR has been engaged. As such, a WG is in charge of:

- → Proposing Resolutions
- → Proposing Action Items
- → Advising the Executive Committee on policy and strategy
- → Undertaking special projects
- → Planning Consultation workshops

Who is involved?

A Working Group is member-driven; two elected Co-chairs, a Steering Committee, an Executive liaison and a CCR staff member make up the WG leadership.



When does a WG meet?

The WG meet 3-4 times a year, virtually or in-person. One meeting takes place in Toronto, earlier in the year, the second takes place in Montreal, later in the year. They also meet at the Consultation(s).



How are issues addressed?

Once members have proposed an issue of general interest to the WG, it is addressed in various ways:

- Organize a workshop/virtual meeting
- Pass a resolution
- Launch a public opinion campaign
- Create practical or policy resources
- Bring attention to the issue in the media
- Take legal action
- Engage in dialogue with government

The impact of our work

- Changes in government policies and
- Changes in the practices of community actors
- Increase in awareness of related issues (public education)
- Increase in knowledge and empowerment of CCR members

Immigration and Settlement

Topics covered:

- Newcomer integration
- Access to services
- Broader social justice issues
- Anti-trafficking and Migrant Workers

Examples of ongoing projects:

- Advocating for regularization of all status through a call to action
- Information sharing and strategizing on how to confront Anti-Black Racism
- Creating a sub-group to discuss issues faced by international students

Inland Protection

Topics covered:

- Refugee claimants issues
- Immigration detention
- Deportation

Examples of ongoing projects:

- Advocacy on immigration detention
- Regular information-sharing on refugee claimant issues and communication of issues to IRCC
- Advocating for special COVID-19 Refugee Claimant Measures to grant permanent residence to claimants

Overseas Protection and Resettlement

Topics covered:

- Protection needs and challenges of refugees
- Resettlement of refugees
- Private sponsorship

Achievements

Achievements

- Developed a practical tool to help people assess whether to apply to the pathway to permanent residency for claimants working in the healthcare sector
- Submitting detailed recommendations to Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) on genderbased violence
- Launch of an advocacy campaign highlighting the horrifically long wait times for refugee family reunification

Achievements

- Made ten recommendations to IRCC following the announcement of their resettlement program for Afghans.
- Engagement in international resettlement discussions through the Annual Tripartite Consultations on Resettlement

Examples of ongoing projects:

- Advocating for increased resettlement to Canada (both Government-Assisted and privately sponsored)
- Exploring barriers to resettlement faced by Palestinian refugees
- Outreach to Group of Five sponsors
