


It is essential to include refugees in advocacy that relates to their rights.

Power wheel (the closer you are to the centre, the more privilege you have):



- Acknowledge your own privilege
- Invite refugee participation
- Respect the form of participation chosen by refugees
- Support refugees to advocate for themselves

About the project

- Groups of newcomer youth across Canada will identify and photograph local people who came to Canada as refugees. They will also interview
 the people so that the photograph can be accompanied by some information on how they contribute to Canada and/or what they recommend
 to make refugees feel at home in Canada.
- The photos and captions will be collected and presented as an online gallery on Instagram and may be used for exhibits (especially around Refugee Rights Day April 4) and in campaign resources.
- Guidelines will be provided to support participating youth.
- Project period: January 2016-April 2016



I will challenge and rebut negative stereotypes about refugees.


I will support speedy reunification for refugee families.
