
#### FCJ REFUGEE CENTRE; WALKING WITH UPROOTED PEOPLE




#### PRECARIOUS MIGRANT POPULATION

- Refers to those populations that hold some form of uncertain migration status often lack work authorization, the right to remain here permanently, social citizen rights, etc...
- ► The weight and consequences of our choice of language
- Undocumented: Often used interchangeably with "non-status", most widely used by the City of Toronto
- ► Non-status: Refers to those living here without official immigration status
- What does this mean now?
  - No access to financial support (eg CERB), housing insecurity, loss of employment, food insecurity etc.

## WHAT IS A SAFE SPACE?

- A safe space is a place where clients, staff and allies can feel welcome and free to share their ideas, stories and needs. A place where people do not need to hide part of their intersecting identities due to fear of being judged.
- Our role as service providers or allies is to create that safe space for the populations with whom we work. Creating a meaningful safe space is part of a process therefore it is our responsibility to constantly revise it and improve it if needed.




# HOW TO CREATE A SAFE SPACE

- ► Do not make assumptions or judgement
- ► Use gender neutral pronouns
- ► Work under an anti-oppressive framework
- Establish safe space group norms
- ► Be open to feedback
- ► Give them space to <u>acknowledge their biases</u>, while maintaining respect of all.
- ► Work together to counter discrimination and violence
- Encourage Youth Led Programs






## ENCOURAGE ADVOCACY BY BEING AN ALLY

- ► Use your privilege & platform!




#### ADVOCACY; IT'S MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER

- Access to education
- Living in high risk neighbourhoods especially in times of pandemic these neighbourhoods are hardest hit.
- ► Family issues & domestic violence
